

Tree Trimming Checklist

	Before beginning the job					
1.	Ensure all staff are trained prior to beginning work. (Training examples include use of harnesses, belts, tree saddles, etc. Training also includes administering first aid).					
2.	Check <u>weather forecast</u> prior to and during work and verify conditions are suitable for work. (You can also use the weather app on your smart phone).					
3.	Determine which method of voice and non-voice communication will be used between workers in the tree and the ground crew, and discuss during the job briefing. (Examples include verbal communication, walkie-talkie, cell phone, hand signals).					
4.	Are all employees equipped with employer-provided personal protective equipment? (This includes a hard hat, gloves, goggles, face protection, leg and foot protection, and hearing protection).					
5.	Perform safety checks on all employer provided tree-climbing equipment and tools. (This includes climbing lines, ropes, lanyards, ladders, aerial lifts, and tools).					
6.	Ensure rope snaps are the locking type with at least 5000 pounds of minimum breaking strength.					
7.	Ensure tools are sharp and functioning properly.					
8.	Ensure chainsaws are operated and maintained onsite, per the operator's manual.					
	Safe work practices					
9.	Designate a drop zone prior to the start of tree work and discuss with all workers at the site.					
10.	Ensure required clearance from power lines is in place.					
11.	Before any climbing begins, the qualified tree worker has visually inspected the tree at the root collar, the tree trunk, and limbs for strength and stability—and has determined the safest way to enter the tree.					
12.	While climbing a tree, the employee must be tied in or secured at all times. (Two lines are required, such as a climbing line and work-positioning lanyard).					
13.	Employees are using two hands when operating a chainsaw or cutting equipment.					
14.	A <u>second employee is onsite</u> to provide immediate assistance when a worker is in a tree above 12 feet.

15.	Do workers carry the chainsaw properly when it's not in use? (Below waist level, with the engine off, and guide bar pointing down and to the rear).					
16.	Employees feed the chipper while standing to the side.					
17.	Ensure aerial equipment is operated safely—taking into account uneven ground, high winds and other conditions.					
18.	Electrical tools and equipment are grounded and insulated.
